CIT ACADEMIC DELIVERY MODEL

This Academic Delivery Model for 2020/21, has been developed in a climate of uncertainty but is based on two guiding principles: the health & safety of CIT students and staff and the effective and consistent delivery of academic programmes maintaining the integrity and high academic and professional standing of our CIT awards. The model assures the continued access to the expertise of our academic staff – profession-based lecturers who want what is best for CIT/MTU students and for their respective professions.

The progress of the COVID-19 pandemic and the consequent public health guidelines will dictate our activities for 2020/2021 and the delivery schedules for respective programmes take into account that these guidelines are likely to change over the year. Numbers of students and staff on campus activities at any given time will clearly be limited due to social distancing rules. Hence the design of the Blended Delivery Model, limiting on-campus time unless deemed essential.

The Student Experience is central to the CIT Community ethos, never a peripheral consideration. This will continue to be so because we want to be so and we will make it so. New supports have already been designed to complement existing Student Support Services to ensure each student will get a rich experience of Higher Education over Academic Year 2020/2021. We will work with our CIT Students Union to reach out and include all students. Our incoming First Year students will be a particular priority.

COVID-19 continues to be an unprecedented emergency. We will work together as students and staff to ensure that the continued focus is on the relevance and professional standing of our individual programmes while simultaneously prioritising the health and safety of students, staff, their families and the community at large.

COVID-19 GUIDELINES

We would like to reassure our students, staff and visitors that we are taking all the steps we possibly can to prevent the spread of the Covid-19 virus and we are committed to providing a safe and healthy environment. We are maintaining the highest possible standards of cleanliness, in line with the advice and guidelines from the Health Service Executive (HSE). We are monitoring the situation daily and we are following official recommendations for the protection of everyone on campus.

A few key points to be noted are:

- The overriding public health advice is that, where possible, all activity should take place remotely and only take place on campus where it is essential, for example, where practical activity is required to meet the learning outcomes of an academic programme. This document provides a detailed breakdown of this planned activity by department.
- The wearing of masks is mandatory indoors in all campus buildings except in single occupant rooms.
- Physical distancing of 2 metres should continue to be observed in general communal areas, in addition to the wearing of masks.
- Students, staff and visitors should wash your hands regularly and use the hand sanitisers available on entry and exit of all buildings.
- Cleaning schedules are in place for all high touch points and key service delivery areas.
- Circulation signage is in place in many areas to include one way and walk on left systems (NMCI walk on right).
- Libraries, Student Services, Restaurant and Retail facilities will continue to operate although capacities are significantly reduced students and staff should use their CIT card for payment in these on campus facilities.
- Temperature checking is not required but we are installing some thermometers in public areas to facilitate self-checks.
- A Remote Working policy has been developed and we will be putting supports in place.
- We recommend that all staff and students download and use the **Ireland Covid Tracker app** available on the Apple App Store or Google Play.
- Do not present on campus if you are feeling unwell.

We want to work together, and we do expect everyone to exercise a high level of self-responsibility. ONLINE LEARNING

Cork Institute of Technology has a long-established expertise in the use of technology for teaching and learning. From the early adoption of video conferencing units and multimedia systems for learning in the early 1990s, to the introduction of the first online learning management system in our sector, we have long been to the fore in looking at new ways to use digital and online solutions to support our staff and students. Since the launch of our fully online MSc in Cloud Computing - the first of its kind in the world – the institute has developed a wide range of highly successful online distance learning programmes, providing, in this way, a real alternative for students who require the flexibility of studying with us at a distance. The underlying model and an associated rich e-learning infrastructure has given us the capacity to respond quickly and effectively to the recent disruption of on-campus activity associated with the COVID-19 pandemic and, at short notice, to move much of our teaching and learning activity online.

At the heart of the institute's e-learning infrastructure is a Learning Management System (also called a Virtual Learning Environment) known as Canvas. The system provides a range of features to support important online teaching and learning functions with respect to assessment, content sharing, communication and collaboration and class management. It was originally chosen as the institute's Learning Management System because of its ease of use, so even if you've not tried it before it's not difficult to find your way around. There are also a lot of resource and training provided through the Department of Technology Enhanced Learning — for more see www.tel.cit.ie — and several planned induction sessions which will be advertised shortly.

The Canvas LMS also serves as a hub for several other e-learning systems within the institute. This means that most of our e-learning systems are accessible from within Canvas and can be used in tandem with each other and with Canvas to support and enhance a wide variety of teaching and learning activities.

One key integrated system in use by many lecturers this semester will be the live communication platform, Zoom. This is a system in use in CIT for the past four years in support of our suite of fully online distance education programmes. In the current context it will provide the key platform for live classes and other real time interactions and communications for staff and students. A deep integration between Canvas and Zoom – based on a strategic partnership between the two providers – ensures a seamless transition between the systems as well as integration features such as the automated publishing of any live recordings from Zoom to Canvas. Depending on the course and module, you may also find the Zoom system in use to live stream or record on-campus teaching and learning events. Further information available from your department and lecturers.

In addition to the integration of Zoom, Canvas also works with Microsoft Teams and a product called Big Blue Button, both of which support quick and easy access to other kinds of live conferencing.

In response to what is still an evolving situation, the institute – in consultation with our staff and students – continues to add to an already rich e-learning infrastructure to ensure the best online and on-campus experience for all our students. COVID-19 - STUDENT ENGAGEMENT CHALLENGES

This coming academic year is going to be different because of the challenges associated with ensuring you can get started with your study while also ensuring your safety and well-being during this COVID-19 pandemic. We are all working hard here at Cork Institute of Technology/Munster Technological University (CIT/MTU) to adjust to the changing circumstances and to ensure that you, our students, have the best student experience possible, in the current circumstances.

Starting a little later and learning remotely, using a blended approach of online, with more limited time on campus, will be challenging for you this year. It is not what you expected, and not what we would have chosen for you, but we are doing our best to make it work for you. There are many pieces of the college student learning experience that will not change and many that will. Some will be better and some we will be working out together as we go along. How we get started this year must be different, we cannot risk your health and safety and yet we can, working positively together, move forward with your education. We urge you to bring your best self to the opportunity that awaits, remote or not.

Student feedback and research tell us that students value relationship with their lecturers and class groups /peers over and above anything else. This is one of our main challenges in the current context. How can we ensure that you, our students, are connected to CIT and build relationship/ presence in different times?

Given our institutional commitment to enhancing Student Engagement, Progression and Success, we are taking some very positive and concrete actions this year to maximise your opportunities to connect with other students and your course teaching and learning development teams.

THE REACH INITIATIVE

Given the student engagement challenges expected in a new type of learning and teaching reality, during COVID-19, this initiative will specifically add a new layer of academic support and development for our students in what, we expect, will be a very challenging time for new and returning 2nd year students in particular. This initiative is a very practical and concrete CIT/MTU response to current challenges.

- The Reach Initiative is a system of Academic Mentoring that will connect new students and continuing 2nd year students with an Academic Mentor (a selected member of teaching staff) who will proactively connect with their allocated group of students to reassure, support and mentor, throughout the coming academic year.
- As part of Student Induction and Department Welcome activities, Academic Mentors will be
 introduced to relevant student groups where they will introduce the Reach Initiative and set out some
 of the ways in which the Academic Mentors will work with students to engage and support their
 learning. Academic Mentors will positively work with students to develop agency and independent
 learning skills, working closely with other CIT programmes such as Academic Success Coaching and
 Academic Learning Centre.
- Academic Mentors will gain insights and feedback from students enabling appropriate responses/ referrals etc for those students who might be struggling.
- Academic Mentors will communicate and check in regularly with students through weekly announcements, updates, discussion groups, study groups online to simply see how they are doing and provide some trusted connection.
- The Reach Initiative will reach out to students through its Academic Mentors, will encourage students to actively reach into CIT and be proactive in making this year work while also encouraging students to reach up and not lose sight of their potential to progress and succeed regardless of the current challenges.

ANSEO -THE STUDENT ENGAGEMENT OFFICE

AnSEO -The Student Engagement Office will manage the Reach Initiative. Other AnSEO programmes have also pivoted their activities to blended /online offerings enabling our students to access our services from wherever they are studying. These include:

GOOD START - INDUCTION PROGRAMME FOR NEW STUDENTS

Good Start is an induction programme for first years. It focuses on cultivating success, belonging, motivation, and independence to help new students find their way and settle into life at CIT during the first weeks of Semester 1 and Semester 2 of First Year.

- Each year Good Start is co-created with a team of current students known as the Good Start Ambassadors, who are recognisable to all by their red hoodies and red Just Ask! T-shirts.
- In 2020/21 Good Start will be stepping up its virtual presence. We are taking to social media, Canvas and email to deliver Good Start to you wherever you are studying. Keep your eyes and ears peeled...and help us to get CIT trending.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS COACHING

Our Academic Success Coaches meet students one to one, in group sessions and visit classes throughout the year, both virtually and face to face. Online and phone sessions are also available. During coaching you can meet with your coach to talk about how college is going for you. Some of the things students talk about are college/life balance, motivation, fitting in with classmates, study techniques & planning, time management, and group projects. - **Post graduate research programmes** All level 9 and level 10 students will continue to work remotely with on campus activity organised on a case by case basis.

DEPARTMENT OF ARTS IN HEALTH AND EDUCATION

The Department of Arts in Health & Education will deliver all theory modules remotely - lectures and related tutorials. Students on the MA programmes spend a large proportion of their time on placement. They will be on campus one or two days a week depending on their programme. The department will also be facilitating workshops outside where possible, exploring the outdoor studio and eco art practice. This will provide a counterbalance to the online environment and expand rather than restrict the scope of students learning as we adapt to the current situation.

PME (Art and Design)

- **First Year**: Students will have lectures online on Tuesdays. They will attend campus for workshops on Wednesday. On Thursday delivery will be blended, with a rotating group attending campus for tutorials and the remainder working online. The remainder of the week students are in schools on placement.
- Second Year: Classes take place on Mondays and the students are on placement for the remainder of the week. All lectures are being delivered online. Both UCC and CIT are using a blended approach for tutorials. A small rotating group will be present on campus while the remainder of the year will have tutorials online at the same time.

MA (Art Therapy)

- First Year: Classes take place on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. Experiential workshops will take place on campus. We are aiming to timetable delivery so that theory will be delivered in blocks on particular days. Class groups won't need to attend on campus on their theory day, reducing the number of days students have to travel to campus. This timetable is currently being worked out.

DEPARTMENT OF MEDIA COMMUNICATIONS

BA (Hons) Visual Communications (CR600)

For Group A, on campus classes will be on Monday and Wednesday and Group B, on campus classes will be Wednesday. The Year coordinators will set up the class groups before the students arrive on campus. All other modules will be delivered remotely.
- Second Year: All modules will be delivered remotely for this year group.
- **Third Year:** All modules will be delivered remotely for this year group with one optional elective, Digital Moving Image which will be on campus for some part of the semester and students will be advised in advance of the timetable.
- Fourth Year: Will be on campus for modules: Design Project and Final Year Project Proposal. On campus classes will be on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday.

BA (Hons) Creative Digital Media (CR112)

- First Year: Students will be on campus for the following modules: Introduction to Digital Media, Moving Image and Sound and Design Basics – Still Image. The initial classes of the CIT module will be delivered on campus to help the 1st year students settle into the course and get prepared for remote delivery and college life. For Group A, on campus classes will be on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday mornings and for Group B on campus classes will be on Monday and Wednesday. The year coordinators will set up the class groups before the students arrive on campus. All other modules will be delivered remotely.
- Second Year: Students will be on campus for these modules: Creative Image Design and electives Applied Animation and Cinematography. On campus classes will be on Thursday with electives on Monday some being on campus and some online. All other modules will be delivered remotely.
- **Third Year**: All classes will be delivered remotely with 2 out of the 3 practical electives delivered on campus on Monday morning.
- **Fourth Year**: Will be on campus for these modules: Virtual Reality and Media and Enterprise. On campus classes will be on Wednesday and Thursday. All other modules will be delivered remotely.

BA (Hons) Photography with New Media (CR225)

- **First Year**: Will be on campus for these modules: Photography and Image Capture and Exploring Light. The initial classes of the CIT module will be delivered on campus to help the 1st year settle into the course and get the students prepared for remote delivery and college life. On campus classes will be on Wednesday and Friday with the CIT module on Tuesday. All other modules will be delivered remotely.
- Second Year: Will be on campus for these modules: Controlling Light and for some electives. On campus classes will be on Tuesday and some on campus electives on Monday and Friday. All other modules will be delivered remotely.

BA (Hons) Fine Art (CR220)
